

Ruchelle Buenaventura is our newest team member working with the Epilepsy Foundation of Virginia, lottesville area. She will be in the office assisting, communicating with patients, and helping create exciting ideas regarding outreach to the community, including memory improvement. She is looking at more efficient ways to connect with through patients communication through videos, social media. and Ruchelle comes to us from Virginia Beach, VA, though she attends American University in

Washington, D.C. majoring in Neuroscience, minoring in Communications, while also in the AU College of Arts and Sciences Leadership & Ethical Development program. She is vastly interested in the field of neuroscience and hopes to become a physician involved with clinical research.

This past spring, she received her third concussion from cheerleading and missed over a month of college. Due to athlete protocol, she took a baseline concussion test in the fall of 2015 that measured her brain efficiency at norm. She took the same test again a month after the initial incident hoping to be cleared for practice, being symptom-free. As a result, her verbal memory and reaction time was below average, which did not clear her for any physical activity. This influenced Ruchelle to work on improving her memory capabilities through online memory games and memory apps, which successfully allowed her to pass those areas in the concussion test she took again only 48 hours after failure. Though her memory is back to full speed, her memory frustrations during the concussion is part of what continuously drives her to explore new solutions for memory pathways in neuroscience. She will also be helping with our trial on memory improvement for epilepsy patients and spreading awareness. Latest PAME conference was very well organized. Parents of young epilepsy heroes who passed, scientists and clinicians worked together to understand better the risks of epilepsy. Generalized tonic clonic seizures, not taking one's medication all contribute to the risks. Then, there are also the unexplained deaths. Approximately 3,500 infants die suddenly and unexpectedly each year in the United States (1). Less is known about the incidence in children because epidemiologic studies of these deaths in children are rare (2). The increased mortality risk in children with undetected heart conditions or epilepsy highlights the need for expanded surveillance to identify sudden unexpected death associated with these conditions (3,4).

Patsy Custis, George Washington's stepdaughter, died suddenly during a brief seizure in 1773. Accounts of Patsy's illness and unexpected death were abstracted from George Washington's papers available via

the Library of Congress. Patsy's epilepsy, the treatments she received, and his descriptions of her death were studied. Sudden unexplained death in epilepsy (SUDEP) criteria are applied and discussed . From George Washington's





description of Patsy's epilepsy and subsequent death meet criteria for SUDEP. When George Washington married widow Martha Custis, he accepted her little boy, Jack, and her daughter, Patsy, as his own. At age 12, Patsy had her first seizure. Physicians could do little at the time. Martha took her daughter to the most skilled medical specialists of the day: One charged \$5 for an iron ring to ward off seizures. Another specialist prescribed ineffective "fit drops." In spite of her illness, Patsy was encouraged to live the same kind of life as other young girls of her day. She was fortunate that those who loved her felt no need to hide her condition.
